quilts displaying a variety of patterns and from quite a span of years. Here are some things we learned:

- ◇ Quilting is traced back to the time of the

crusaders in the 12th century who were the first known quilters. They quilted cloth to create padding to wear under their armor.

- ◇ There are four types of quilting: applique, block and patchwork, paper piecing, and trapunto.

- ◇ Many quilts were made of fabric from flour sacks in the years before WWII. At that point cloth was needed for uniforms, so flour sacks were made out of paper instead.

- ◇ During the height of activity of the Underground Railroad (1830s-1860s), quilts were sometimes used to give messages to those traveling to freedom in the North. They might give messages such as how

far it was to the next safe house based upon codes in the patterns, how many times the knots on the quilt were tied, or by how far apart the knots were. Among the common patterns used for this purpose were: monkey wrench, wagon wheel, log cabin, shoofly, double wedding ring, tumbling boxes, bear's paw, crossroads, and stars.

- ◇ Quilts were used for bedding, window & door coverings, floor coverings for cabins to give young children a soft and clean place to play, and even as currency.
